Heading closer to the terminus of the park, the Tunnel Hill Trail is a hidden beauty. This strenuous trail climbs over Paw Paw Tunnel, offering breathtaking river views and plenty of geological and historical lessons. This trail connects to the Green Ridge State Forest, creating even more room to explore and discover new hidden gems. Visitors can opt to take the trail both ways, or explore the Paw Paw Tunnel during one way of travel. Just remember to bring a flashlight!
